








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A MESSAGE FROM THE GTNT GROUP CEO



A standout moment was supporting the repair of the rail and ship loader conveyor systems at Darwin Port, where she quickly learned the value of accuracy and collaboration with her tradesman, Louis, boosting her confidence and enhancing her technical expertise.
